### \$7.24 million for seven community projects in Los Angeles County:

- **Homeboy Industries' Trainee Program \$2 million:** This funding will support career pathway training and social services to formerly gang-involved and previously incarcerated individuals.
- Los Angeles County Mental Health Urgent Care Center \$1.5 million: This funding will help build a replacement mental health urgent care center on the LAC-USC Restorative Care Village, which will provide a robust mental health continuum of care for residents of Boyle Heights and the surrounding community.
- City of Palmdale Emergency Operations Center \$1.31 million: This funding will upgrade the City of Palmdale's emergency operations center, which will provide a modernized center for incident coordination, communication, and resource management during an emergency situation or natural disaster.
- City of South Gate Emergency Operations Center \$1.23 million: This funding will support the renovation of a current city facility to serve as a new emergency operations center.
- Wildland Fire Training Program at Mt. San Antonio College \$534,000: This funding will provide equipment for the Wildland Fire Training Program at Mt. San Antonio College.
- Trauma-Informed ACES Screening Program at Gateways Hospital and Mental Health Center in Los Angeles \$500,000: This funding will expand a program to provide trauma-informed care for adolescents in Los Angeles County.
- City of La Verne Emergency Operations Center \$169,000: This funding will support upgrades to the City of La Verne's Emergency Operations Center

# \$5.42 million for five community projects in the Central Valley:

- City of Tulare Regional Business Accelerator \$2.5 million: This funding will support the creation of a small business accelerator in the City of Tulare to create opportunities for equitable economic growth in the City, County, and greater region.
- Open Door Network to provide wraparound services for individuals at risk of experiencing homelessness in Kern County \$1.5 million: This funding will support programming to provide safe, stable housing with wraparound case management, education, and employment support to reduce poverty and improve economic outcomes.
- Madera County Emergency Medical Services Equipment \$940,000: This funding will purchase emergency medical equipment for Madera County EMTs.

- Mobile Mental Health Access Point for Rural Californians Project in Merced and Stanislaus Counties \$357,000: This funding will enable La Familia Central Valley to pilot a mobile mental health clinic to expand culturally-competent mental health care access in rural counties.
- Geriatric Whole Community Pilot Program in Merced County \$125,000: This pilot program will provide comprehensive, interdisciplinary care to Medicare and dually-enrolled Medicare and Medicaid patients living with severe mental illness and chronic medical conditions.

### \$5.03 million for three community projects in the San Diego region:

- San Diego County Public Health Laboratory Equipment \$2.5 million: This funding will help San Diego County acquire new equipment for a planned new public health laboratory.
- UC San Diego PATHS Scholars Program \$1.66 million: This program will help enhance access for historically underrepresented students in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and medicine at University of California San Diego.
- South Bay Community Services Promise Neighborhood in San Diego County \$876,000: This funding will support the South Bay Community Services Promise Neighborhood, which provides a two-generational approach implemented by local community organizations to address barriers to success and specific needs in K-12 education.

# \$4.96 million for five community projects in the Bay Area:

- California State University East Bay for the Hayward Promise Neighborhood \$1.2 million: This funding will support the Hayward Promise Neighborhood, which provides a two-generational approach implemented by local community organizations to address barriers to success and specific needs in K-12 education.
- Asian Health Services Community Health and Wellness Hub in the City of San Leandro \$1 million: This funding will help construct a community health and wellness hub to provide medical, dental, behavioral health, and trauma-informed care to underserved community members.
- Southeast Health Center Behavioral Health Outpatient Clinic Expansion Project in San Francisco \$1 million: This project will renovate the old Southeast Health Center in San Francisco to provide two outpatient behavioral health programs.
- Gilroy Youth Impact Center \$840,000: The Gilroy Youth Impact Center will provide direct resources for youth and families while serving as an economic

empowerment hub.

• Mission Economic Development Agency for the Mission Economic Development Agency Promise Neighborhood — \$750,000: This funding will support the Mission Economic Development Agency Promise Neighborhood, which provides a two-generational approach implemented by local community organizations to address barriers to success and specific needs in K-12 education.

## \$4.08 million for three community projects along the Central Coast:

- Nursing Program Expansion at Allan Hancock College \$1.5 million: This funding
  will expand Allan Hancock College's nursing program capacity and training for bilingual
  nurses.
- City of Thousand Oaks Water Pump Microgrid \$1.38 million: This funding will support the installation of microgrids at critical water pump stations in the City of Thousand Oaks to support continuous water supply during wildfires and power outages.
- Arroyo Grande Creek Levees in San Luis Obispo County \$1.2 million: This funding would support a project to evaluate potential flood easement areas that would provide additional flood protection and reduce flood impacts to an area south of Arroyo Grande Creek that experienced catastrophic flooding in 2001 and 2023.

### Additional community projects receiving funding include:

- City of Anaheim Emergency Operations Center \$1.5 million (Orange County): This funding will help to modify and convert an existing structure in Anaheim to serve as a new emergency operations center.
- City of Calimesa Emergency Operations Center \$1 million (Inland Empire): This funding will support development of the City's emergency operations center.
- Save the Children's Food Security Initiatives \$1 million (Several Regions): This funding will increase access to food and educational resources for children facing income and educational inequities in Fresno, Tulare, Los Angeles, Kings, Kern, and Madera County.
- Infant & Toddler Care Expansion and Capacity Building \$850,000 (Sacramento): This funding will support and build on existing partnerships between the City of Sacramento and local non-profit organizations to assist providers of infant and toddler care in expanding capacity in underserved and underinvested communities.
